

ou founded Earthfall with Jim Ennis almost 25 years ago. What was its mission, has that changed since, and what is the secret of its longevity and your long-term leadership of it?

We started Earthfall after both Jim Ennis and myself had worked in professional touring theatre/dance companies for about ten years. Our mission was to make exciting innovative performance by combining dance, theatre, image and live music. I think in essence our mission is still the same, although as we have been exposed to so much theatre and theatre making over the years it gets harder for us to find any truly original way forward. We have to delve deeply to keep challenging ourselves, like choosing to dance on 41/2 tons of coal in Girl Standing by a Lake or on a slowly filling surface of water for At Swim Two Boys! Also to keep locating themes that we can put our hearts into which seem mostly to revolve around humanity and inhumanity. This is probably why we continue to survive by making sure we still have something to say combined with our stubborn perseverance and having a strong creative and managerial team around us.

How did Chelsea Hotel come about, and why did you choose this subject to bring to British audiences?

With us, ideas emerge as seeds and infiltrate our thoughts for many years. We draw on personal experiences and passions as well as social issues and world and domestic politics - we call this *chorcopolitic*. We got interested in the 1950s/60s because it was such a huge period of political and artistic change; New York seemed to express this in a dynamic and concentrated way. In our previous work we looked at Warhol's Silver Factory and juxtaposed it with the significant events of these decades, such as the rise of the civil rights movement, the assassination of Martin Luther King, JFK and attempted assassination of Warhol himself, the emergence of feminism and the US involvement in the Vietnam war plus the anti-Vietnam demonstrations. Although our work was based around NY the ideas and issues are universal, and unfortunately still relevant. Take the bi-lateral and unilateral discussions today regarding Syria and the sexist issues still present in Australian politics - Julia Gillard, etc. It seems we also caught the popular cultural zeitgeist of the moment with the success of Mad Men on TV. So this is a long winded way of saying our researches kept coming back to events and people in the Chelsea Hotel so much so that we knew sooner or later we would have to make a piece based around this infamous building and its even more infamous inhabit-

The hotel has a kaleidoscopic history, involving everyone from Dylan Thomas to Janis Joplin. Are these characters all part of your narrative? We have used an essence of the building and story fragments and character fragments mixed with our own fictionalisation and personal experiences to make up the choreographic and fractured narrative of our show. One of the strongest resources we focused on when creating the work was Patti Smith's book Just Kids which told about her relationship with photographer Robert Mapplethorpe. We also looked at the artistic creations which were created in the building, so we used character elements derived from Stanley and Stella from A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams. In some ways there was too much to choose from. I think we could make 10 new productions easily drawing from the huge artistic resource of the Chelsea Hotel!

The original Chelsea Hotel was one of the famous Hubert Home Clubs devised as residences for artists. Does it still; exist, and is your piece calling for Hubert Home Clubs to be revived?

The hotel does exist but it has changed its nature in the last few years. It is being renovated and turned into a high class hotel. There is a big movement for it to remain with a least a portion of its original ethos; when it was managed by Stanley Bard and before that his father they would support the artists living in the building by allowing them to exchange their art works for rent if they were strapped for cash. Some of the famous names associated with the building have campaigned to save it as a home for artists; even Patti Smith gave a fund raising concert there a few years back, and there have been numerous newspaper articles published about the battle for the integrity of the building to remain. Our piece is a celebration of the free spirit that inhabited the building, maybe in a small way it can work towards its protection..

It is rare for a company to specialise in dance theatre. Is there a good audience for it?

Audiences tell us our work is very enjoyable, provocative and engaging. However, we find that many people have a pre conception of dance theatre which doesn't match with our productions, which are actually very accessible to new dance theatre audiences. I think that in the past we have suffered from people not really understanding where we fit in to normal audience expectations, and this is where marketing has become so important to us in helping people to understand what our work is really about.

Our audiences definitely come from a lot of different backgrounds contemporary dance, physical theatre, experimental theatre and, of course, music fans. We have always put marketing and engagement as central to the organisation and have been very effective in the past few years at developing and retaining our audiences. We have recently employed a digital engagement officer, through a project funded by Arts Council Wales, to continue to develop our audience engagement and to find new ways to extend and enhance this engagement.

You are funded by the arts councils of Wales and England among other public bodies. How important is subsidy to you, and does it have drawbacks?



Revenue support from Arts Council Wales is essential for our company; our subsidy enables us to be brave and create devised work, to explore new ideas and to employ a team of skilled performers and creative collaborators. The costs of touring have substantially increased over the past few years and touring subsidy from both the Arts Council Wales and England enables theatres to present us at venues across the UK to a wide and diverse audiences.

Touring is increasingly important in the present cultural atmosphere and Earthfall is embarking on a big three month tour of 17 venues from Cardiff to London, but is the need for suitable venues being met?

We adapt our performance environ-

ment to fit the different parameters of each venue. Obviously we cannot fit in some spaces, there has to be a minimum requirement. We like to take advantage of architectural features in the theatres we visit so if we have time we will reblock sections of the piece to allow us to utilise these

We know that are a host of suitable venues in the UK that would fit our work perfectly, but due to financial pressures they are narrowing the breadth of their programming.

You are based in Chapter, Cardiff. What are the advantages of that?

It's been really advantageous to be based in Cardiff at Chapter Arts Centre. When we started up it gave us support with studio space, marketing etc and the fact that it is a creative arts hub means we can work closely with film makers, musicians, creative writers and visual artists. We can network effectively with the Arts Council Wales, Welsh Assembly Government and Wales Arts International. On the down side, we are working against the English preconception of Wales as being parochial; there was a time when it was easier for us to get touring in Brussels, Berlin, Warsaw and Amsterdam than London.

We are currently working with Chapter and two other companies to try and secure our own dedicated rehearsal studio.

Do you collaborate with other companies, and will his happen more?

One of our longest collaborations is with Polish company Theatre Association Chorea based in Lodz. We've known the founders of this group for more than 20 years and were instrumental in its development. Together we have created three co-productions which have toured to Poland, Wales, Russia and India. We hope to sustain our relationship with Chorea and other artists we know and have worked with internationally.

In Wales we recently directed a short film for 360 degree dome cinema, Pal O'Me Heart, which has just received its premiere at the Edinburgh Festival in collaboration with Coreo Cymru and Urban Reaction Research Lab

We are hoping to work with a Welsh based company, Make and See, who are at the forefront of digital technology for a collaborative project for 2014/15.

What will happen to Chelsea Hotel after the tour?

We hope that we can sustain the life of the show by creating a short film based around the live version. So far we have created 5 short standalone films which are recrafted specifically for the film medium. We will also put all the original live music on our website for free download. 

People lived and worked in the hotel for days, months or years, with some becoming permanent residents.



The Hotel witnessed murders suicides and famous affairs, while also being a hive for creative production and a bohemian centre for artists of that

Performed through contemporary dance, live music and film Chelsen Hotel blazes a trail from Patti Smith and Robert Mapplethorpe to Dylan Thomas and Tennessee Williams; with stories revealing the inhabitant's lives, loves and longings.
Earthfall's performers move through tender duets, violent encounters and ersemble movement.
The use of toxt and spoken word is inspired by the works of the Beat Poets who lived at the Hotel and the score, a mixture of songs and instrumental pieces influenced by musicians of that time, is performed live on stage by three musicians.






Various Venues

Earthfall on UK tour

Visiting South Holland Centre, Spalding as part of a UK tour, this innovative Cardiff based company presents a combination of dance, live music and film to convey a picture of life at New York's famously eccentric ChelseaHotel. The hotel was a favourite place to stay in the mid 20th century for transient writers, musicians and artists, from Dylan Thomas to Marianne Faithful.

The talented group plays a variety of instruments on stage, and the dancers take time off from some breathtakingly energetic routines to provide the live commentary, while a video screen at the back of the stage shows images representing the rundown hotel. The show opens with all four dancers on a sleazy bed, from which they take off to perform some highly acrobatic moves incorporating tables, chairs and a fridge. A signature move is balancing at an angle, legs in the air, seeming to defy gravity for several seconds at a time. Most impressive – this is a company with diverse talents. The undience was mostly of mature years but they obviously got the message as there was hearty applause at the end. The music was reminiscent of several groups in the sixties including Pink Floyd and Doors. Jean Ruxh

"Our production is a crazy mixture of poetic movement, sex, violence, rock and roll, anger, companionship, cowboys and ghosts." says co-director Jessica Cohen. "It blends truth with lies, reality with

Live musicians will be prowling the stage alongside the dancers and will be performing original music. And there'll be a General Motors fridge on set for added vintage authenticity.

Chelsea Hotel is touring England and Wales until 5th December 2013, taking in no fewer than 17 towns, including Aberystwyth, Plymouth and Lincoln. A lengthy residency at London's Riverside Studios runs from $5^{\rm th}$ -16 $^{\rm th}$ November.


BACKSTAGE PASS CHELSEA HOTEL

Earthfall dance company co-founder Jim Ennis on dancing with the ghosts who haunt New York's legendary Chelsea Hotel

We were researching New York sub-culture and found we kept coming back to the Chelsea Hotel. Artists were attracted there like moths to a flame, there were so many stories to tell from within its walls. You feel the spirit of the place even now. It started life a century ago as apartments for eastern European immigrants and then became an important place for artists. If you didn't have the rent, you could trade a piece of art.

Patti Smith said it was like 'a doll's house in the twilight zone'. Her writing about it has been a big influence. So many writers lived there for a time: Arthur Miller took refuge there after the death of Marilyn [Monroe]. Jack Kerouac wrote there, too.

The best way to describe what we've done is a dance homage to the hotel. We've been true to the original spirit of the place. What we're evoking is the residue the ghosts of the inhabitants have left behind. We use music, film and dance to create the mood. The set has period echoes: we've got a 1950s General Motors fridge and a boudoir bed – all vintage retro.

Musicians walk through the show as they play, like they would have done back in the day. But it's original music: we don't want it to be a documentary, because it's also about imagining ourselves in the space.

The dancers don't play actual characters, they are composite ideas of people. So there's Dylan Thomas, Sam Shepherd, a couple


of cowboys – people who come and go. But you can definitely see Patti Smith, Robert Mapplethorpe and a female Jack Kerouac figure. If you know the era, you can play celeb-spotting. **Keith Watson**



CHELSEA HOTEL

Arthur C Clarke wrote 2001: A Space Odyssey there, Dylan Thomas, and Sid Vicious' girlfriend died there. It has been the home of numerous writers, musicians, artists, and actors, including Bob Dylan, Mark Twain, O Henry, Tennessee Williams, Frida Kahlo, Allen Ginsberg, Janis Joplin, Leonard Cohen, Patti Smith, Iggy Pop, Gaby Hoffmann, Jobriath, Larry Rivers, Robert Mapplethorpe and Viva, to name but a few.

Opened in 1884, this 12 storey block was one of the first private apartment co-operatives located in the then heart of the theater district. This district's relocation and the popularity of Upper Manhatten led to bankruptcy and a re-opening as a hotel in 1905. In 2011 it was sold to real-estate developers and stopped taking reservations. Some long-time residents are still there, including Ed Hamilton, author of Legends of the Chelsea Hotel: Living with the Artists and Outlaws in New York's Rebel Mecca:

"I came here to be a writer because it seemed like the place to be. And I had always heard about the Chelsea Hotel because American novelist Thomas Wolfe and the Beat Generation writers had lived here. The Chelsea has an energy that's infectious. I felt it the moment I walked in the door and have never ceased to feel it. Of course part of this is the energy of New York as well, which for me, since I've never lived anywhere else in New York, is inseparable from the energy of the Chelsea.

"The Chelsea Hotel was a place where the famous and the deviants were welcomed and tolerated, and failure and weakness is understood. Andy Warhol's film *Chelsea Girls* (1966), the classic experimental split-screen film, was shot largely in the hotel. Numerous Warhol Superstars including Edie Sedgwick, Viva, and Nico also lived at the hotel.

"Bob Dylan stayed up for days in the Chelsea Hotel writing his song Sara. In fact he wrote the whole of his Blonde on Blonde album when he lived at the Hotel and reportedly had an affair with Edie Sedgwick, on which several of the songs in the Blonde on Blonde album are based.

"Leonard Cohen famously bedded Janis Joplin and later wrote a song about it, *Chelsea Hotel #2*.

"The hotel was already being gentrified during the '90s and early '00s but it wasn't happening fast enough to please the Hotel's minority shareholders, who had been putting pressure on the Bard family demanding a greater return on their investment and pressuring them to sell the Hotel. Because of Stanley Bard's reluctance to sell (among other things) they pushed the Bard family out in a hostile takeover in 2007.

"The minority shareholders used the interceding four years to prepare the building for sale. Those four years were critical. Several tenants, including myself, waged a very public, aggressive battle to support the Bard family. The "Bring Back the Bards" battle was fought through the courts, online and in the streets. Because we were unsuccessful, The Chetrit Group, a billion dollar real estate concern, bought the Hotel in 2011*. They immediately



closed it to tourists and began mass destruction of the building. Practically all of the rooms that were not occupied by tenants at the time the Chetrit Group purchased the hotel have been demolished. They've completely gutted the rooms tearing out all of the old molding and features in an attempt to turn the Hotel into some sort of cookie cutter boutique hotel.

"There will always be tourists and transients who will want to come to partake of the last vestiges of the Chelsea's Bohemian élan even if the Hotel is nothing more than a shell of its former self. For now, it looks like when the present tenants go, that will be the end of the place as an artist's haven. This is a real shame. On the other hand, most of the Chelsea community has been dispersed over the years anyway; just because people leave the Chelsea doesn't mean they cease to be residents in spirit. Despite recent changes, the hotel is also a place where the past is alive, coloring and influencing the lives and struggles of the artists of the present day. The legends of the past continue to grow and develop, and new legends take shape daily." See the resident's blog http://legends typepad.com.



ST LUKE'S CHURCH, LIVERPOOL (THE BOMBED-OUT CHURCH)

Paul McNamer writes: Look skyward along the steeple, from the bottom of the steep just opposite Bold Street, and it appears to be an interesting piece of Victorian Gothic architecture, Move up towards the entrance and you begin to see what this really is. The bombed-out church was opened in 1843 and bombed during the Liverpool Biltz in 1941. While the interior blazed, the exterior shell stood, it is defiant still, inside, there are score marks on the stone and burnt beam remnants. You'll want to touch them, There is a curious, smart installation about the motorcor in a side altar. The man at the desk says the place is busiest, full of life and celebration, on Chinese new year, Visit Gilbert Scott's Cathedral and its Cathedra echo in Paddy's Wigwarn, by all means but this is worth a diversion, dishippelsus.







New York City, the Chelsea Hotel. A niche abode for the 'art set' to see and be seen - or a romanticised doss house, magnet to a strata of disparate beings in need of collective peer approval?

Earthfall, Wales' foremost contemporary dance company, embrace the self-perpetuating legend of this, in effect, apartment block that has served as crèche to some of the 20th century's most notable creative walfs and strays.

The ensemble of four dancers and three musicians experience the hotel as a dining table and four chairs, a large American fridge and a metal framed bedstead, all of which they love, lose, loosen and lounce upon.

The dance troupe use multi-media to enhance their cause. A large video screen at the rear of the stage acts variously as wallpaper, a punka ceiling fan, and shows the dancers riding the caged lift to the gods. Addressing a side-of-stage camera, her face and message transmitting to all, one of the young women introduces her friends as modern travellers who check in, hoping to feel the vibe and inhale what's left of the hoters atmosphere, thus opening the door of our entry too, into that abnormal

Like fairground visitors to a ghost house, relationships between the characters are expressed physically as edgy, petulant and distorted, as the difficult aura overtakes these now time traveillers, upsetting their collective equilibrium, shattering their innocency.

The historically loaded view from Dylan Thomas' final hotel room is shown, and later the dancers reveal a glimpse of Patti Smith and photographer Robert Mapplethorpe's inter-dependency and quite possibly, Andy Warhol with the power-playing, wild-child model Edie Sedgwick.

There's some delightful, if slightly unhinged, light relief when two Victorian ghost children possessed of a poltergeist energy, burst from the stage to venture into the stalls, skipping and teasing amongst the audience.

The musicians play as rock'n'roll residents, and supply a range of there-or-thereabouts homage pieces that set the scene; the '80s is represented through the steady beat of a drum machine, something from the era that placed Bowle and Lou Reed in one place (accompanied by some choppy Leon Garfield-inspired piano), as the two male and two female dancers create re-imagined embryonic relationships before discovering a comfort in unified movement and huddling in the lift to return to our century.

The Chelsea Hotel closed to new guests in 2011 in preparation for an expected anodyne redevelopment, closing the huge register of famous names associated with the place. Names, whose blood, sweat and (one suspects a vial or two of self-absorbed) tears soaked into the turnishings. Opening in 1884 as a socialist experiment in which rich and poor would live in the same building, it was soon a destination for struggling artists.

In this production, where the hote's atmosphere and reputation is everything, my grasp of a tangible essence of this portal to other lives differs little from when I took my seat this evening, but Earthfall have added to the scatological mysticism a surface gossamer, that reinforces the Chelsea Hotel's own description of itself as a "rest stop for rare individuals".
